2019 Arkansas Travels and Guide to Mustangs on the Mountain 2020

Since many of us are planning to attend the MCA Thunder on the Mountain show this year, I wanted to write about my 2019 travels to Eureka Springs and the surrounding areas to give everyone ideas about what to see and do while there and on the way! My October trip was with friends, so I couldn't take the

Mustang. But I was glad I didn't, because parking is minimal and navigating those narrow, high inclined, switchback side streets in the cramped downtown area would be a nightmare in a low car!

We took two days to drive to Eureka Springs, staying the first night at the Queen Wilhelmina Lodge just outside Mena, on the Arkansas end of the Scenic Talimena Scenic Byway. The views from the Lodge are breathtaking and the onsite restaurant was a lifesaver at the end of a long day of driving. The next day we took a long and scenic route to Eureka Springs, stopping at the Tuberculosis Sanitorium Museum in Booneville, Mount Magazine (more breathtaking views), and then driving the Scenic Pig Trail Bypass with its many switchbacks and fun curves.

We stayed at the Basin Park Hotel in Eureka, but on our next trip we plan to stay at the Crescent Hotel farther away. You can see both in the picture, the Basin has the green awning and the Crescent is the huge building farthest away. Both are very

old and haunted! You do to do their nightly ghost tours. We did the Crescent VIP tour and were

not have to stay at either on edge the entire time!





In addition to fantastic ghost tours, Eureka Springs has lots of small shops, bars, restaurants and art galleries right in the center of town. There are also historic Queen Anne tours, museums, magic shows, music shows, and plays.

A few miles south of town is one of my favorite attractions, Turpentine Creek Wildlife Refuge. They are a forever home to mostly tigers, but also lions, leopards, cougars, bobcats, bears and monkeys. We took the last tour of the day, which has a bonus demonstration of their Behavioral Management Program. By training them with

"treats" it allows them to administer vaccines and check stitches, etc, without the stress of sedating and transferring the animals to the onsite vet clinic. It has been a huge success; apparently big kitties love treats as much as the small ones!

Some other great attractions close to Eureka Springs (that make for a great drive in the Mustang) are Thorncrown Chapel, the Christ of the Ozarks statue, and Beaver Lake. We ventured a bit farther out of town (35 miles SW) to attend the annual War Eagle Craft Fair at the War Eagle Mill. The Mill is open yearround and is a working mill with a still drivable single lane bridge over the creek.





On a separate trip to Arkansas, I finally got to see the Arkansas Grand Canyon, about 67 miles SE of Eureka Springs. Another quick scenic drive about 20 miles west of the Grand Canyon is the Buffalo River and the Boxley Valley Elk herd. They are usually in the fields at a distance, but on my trip one guy decided it was time for his close-up; talk about right time, right place!

MCA Thunder on the Mountain Tip #1: Park the Mustang for the show and leave it! Only drive it on the main highways (show hotel roads are fine) or if you plan to do a cruise or any sightseeing outside the city. Most people walk or take the trolley anyway, as parking is minimal in the heart of town.



We parked in the lot reserved for our hotel and walked or took their shuttle, so did very little driving ourselves while in town.

MCA Thunder on the Mountain Tip #2: Make sure to see some of the sights in Eureka, whether it be the history museum, a Queen Anne tour, shopping, or a nightly ghost tour!

MCA Thunder on the Mountain Tip #3: Try to do a little sightseeing outside of town too, the drives are wonderful and there are so many scenic views and photo opportunities! I highly recommend Turpentine Creek and it's only a 15 minute drive from town!

MCA Thunder on the Mountain Tip #4: If you will be busy with the car show all weekend, try to schedule a day or two extra to see some sights before or after the show!

MCA Thunder on the Mountain Tip #5: If you are driving, try to share the driving with your passenger or split the trip into two days. The quickest (and least scenic) drive is about 10 hours, but who wants to drive through DALLAS? I recommend taking 259 through Longview and East Oklahoma where you can hop on part of the Talimena Byway (if you have time) or just continue on 259/59 and see the Three Sticks Monument in the Ouachita Forest (still a great drive). If you are lucky enough to have time, I highly recommend taking the entire Talimena Byway! You can access it by driving through Paris, Hugo, and Antlers to Talihina, OK where it starts. All of these drives will also take you through historic Fort Smith, AR and Fayetteville, AR home of my alma mater (unless you want to get even more scenic)!


